
The feel-good factor

A Day in the life of Simon Bailey (Trainee Manager)



There can't be a more thorough grounding for life itself than to pass through the Langdale Trainee Manager's training plan schedule. As trainee manager Simon Bailey works his way through operations throughout the Estate from hotel housekeeping to finance, he's learned from experience not to be surprised by anything any more, truth being stranger (and funnier) than fiction.

Take, for example, Simon's first day as Duty Manager, when a minor misunderstanding soon took on the proportions of a Whitehall farce. Who's been sleeping in my bed?

It all started innocently enough one afternoon just before Christmas when a foreign family arrived for their first RCI exchange at Langdale in Elterwater Hall Apartment 2, and made a map-reading error which led them instead to the Barn. Naturally the key didn't fit, so they asked a couple of groundsmen emptying the bins why their key didn't work - "No matter", said the obliging lads, "Use ours!" Once inside the family were delighted at what they assumed was the welcome box of groceries (specially ordered and pre-paid for by the real owners!). The family made themselves at home, then cooked and ate the food, drank the wine spread themselves comfortably across the settees. And when, at 6.30pm the owners duly arrived and opened their door to find a family of six already in residence, they were less than happy!

Acting quickly on an irate call from the owners, Simon moved them down to the Bar for free drinks, and accompanied the non-English speaking RCI exchange family into Elterwater Hall. Then it was a quick sprint

back to the Hotel Lounge with more reassurances for the owners plus free dinners all round in Purdey's - then a mad dash to find Annette, the Lodge Housekeeper, to ask her to lend a hand doing a full lodge clean at the Barn... "the family had managed to use everything, including all the beds"! Simon recalled wryly. "It was a bit like Goldilocks and the Three Bears - a question of 'who's been sleeping in our beds?' By the end of the evening, we had them moved into the barn. It was my first ever call-out and undoubtedly my worst - it reminded me of Families at War on BBC1!'

Candlelit Dinner (nine hour!)

No amount of training could have prepared Simon for a legendary Christmas Day power cut at Langdale:

"Langdale power cuts are different", Simon revealed. "We were getting ready for Christmas Day lunch on the Terrace, when all the power went off. Linda Turner, the Terrace Manager reassured us that it happened all the time, and the power would be on within five minutes. The first people came in at 12.30 for Christmas lunch - it wasn't too bad then, as it was still light... just!

The kitchen was dark, though - and hot due to the 300 candles we were using, and no air conditioning! The lunch went quite well considering we had no power, but I did feel like an usherette at the cinema with a torch asking people if they enjoyed their meal!

Search party

When we lost a small child in the dark for half an hour, I did start to panic, but we found her playing in the corner with her father's brand new cam-corder... she had poured Coke all over it. I suppose we quite enjoyed the day, although we were still cooking turkeys at 9pm, and when the power came back on, we could see the (very big) mess! I've never experienced power cuts like this in any other hotels before... then it happened again the year after!

"After six years in catering, the best part of my job is the variety of duties, rather than just food and beverages; as a trainee manager, I get to do lots of other things including administration, but the hardest thing about my job is remembering everything. There's so much to take in... and so many changes."

Casey's Casebook:

Our resident young expert on squirrels comes up with some fascinating observations:

A head for heights

Squirrels have short front legs and much longer hind legs and their strong claws and doublejointed hind legs enable them to climb both up and down. With sharp all-round vision and a good sense of smell, their senses are geared towards finding food and avoiding tree climbing accidents. Whiskers on the head, feet, and tail provide early warnings for bumping into things - an advantage on a windy evening in the tree tops. Their bushy tails help them balance and are used to signal their mood as well as keeping them warm when they are asleep. We now have a feeder in our garden and if ever our cats are sitting at the bottom of the tree the squirrel goes mad. He makes a very loud croaking noise and jerks his tail into a curve then springs it out in a thrusting movement in order to warn them off.

Are grey squirrels a problem?

Although squirrels may carry a variety of diseases, they are only transmittable to other squirrels. In addition to infrequent nest robbing, grey squirrels may be unwanted visitors at bird tables and eat your garden bulbs. Grey squirrels may also invade your house and are a particular nuisance in lofts where they can chew electric cables. To avoid this, ensure that any gaps under your eaves are too small for squirrels to enter.

Squirrels cause damage in forests and parks by peeling off tree bark. These stripped areas are vulnerable to insect and fungal attack. If a squirrel removes a complete ring of bark from a tree trunk the supply of nutrients is cut off and everything above the

ring dies. Bark stripping can be a problem in beech and hornbeam woodlands. It can affect the long term survival of beech trees and so management of the grey squirrel population may be required.

It is also important to halt the spread of grey squirrels into areas with red squirrel populations. Where both occur it may be necessary to control the numbers of greys to allow the endangered reds to survive.

Survival of the reds

In coniferous forests red squirrels outcompete grey squirrels, being lighter and so better adapted for eating pine seeds from the ends of thin branches.

The survival of red squirrels is not solely dependent on the spread of grey squirrels. Like many species they are directly threatened by habitat destruction and by the erosion of the quality of their woodland homes. For this to continue as "a tale of two squirrels", all these issues need to be addressed.

Buy the metre

Repair work on The Band, the footpath from Stool End Farm to the col between Bowfell and Crinkle Crags is progressing rapidly, thanks largely to our owners, whose contributions have reached record levels. We continue to receive regular donations to pay the salary of our full-time footpath repairman -Peter Entwistle 'The Man at the Top' (over £10,000 this year to date) - and in addition, 23 of our owners and guests have paid for the repair of a metre of footpath each by individual sponsorship, raising over £1,000 for this project alone. Peter and his coworkers are planning a number of walks and talks to include their work on The Band - if you want to meet them, go and visit them at work on the lower section of The Band (Mon-Fri, till late October) or ring the NT Warden on 37131 to check their whereabouts

Meanwhile, for those of you who are still wondering why stone occasionally drops out of the Langdale skies by helicopter, we have a report from David Wilkinson, National Trust Property Manager:

"The Band is a public right of way that provides access for walkers and climbers onto popular mountains and to climbing routes on Bowfell Buttress and other crags. It is extremely visible from the valley and surrounding fells and the gradual erosion of this footpath has been of concern for some time, both in terms of scarring one of the most scenic views in the Lake District and because of the damage to the environment in the locality of the path.

In order to halt the erosion and to produce a footpath that is sustainable both in terms of its visual appearance and maintenance, the National Trust has undertaken to repair and improve it. Work started in June 1998 and the project will last two and a half years, costing £210,000 overall. Work is crammed into the spring autumn period, but has to stop during winter, and has also involved the National Park Authority, the British Mountaineering Council and English Nature.

The project has been split into three sections: the lower section of The Band (A), the higher section of The Band (B), and the footpath that leaves The Band towards Bowfell Buttress known as the Climbers Traverse (C). During 1998 work concentrated on section B; 350m of footpath were improved including 300m of "pitched" path, repaired with large stones which were gathered

locally. Landscaping the fellside around the footpath involved relocating stones and soil before reseeding with a mixture of normal grass seed and rye grass, which is resistant to wear and tear and binds the loose soil allowing the native grass to get established before the rye eventually dies out.

Work resumed in April to finish section B and start C, but because stone was in short supply on the fellside, a helicopter lift of 20 tons of stone from Oxendale Beck took place in early June. The first 150m of section C have not been improved in case it leads walkers unaware of the hazards ahead onto this exposed path. Work on C included pitching, landscaping and "realignment", where several paths have developed and the most suitable is chosen. Improvements on both sections B and C are now complete and work has begun on the most visible scar from the Valley, section A. In just six hours, a helicopter lift bringing 130 tons of stone saved weeks of hard labour; you can see the stone laid out along the path in white bags, and a further 200 tons will be dropped next year to complete 800m of pitching.

Work should finish by 1st September 2000 and has cost the National Trust £65758 (up till 1 June 1999), being mainly labour costs. We are fortunate and grateful for grant aid and sponsorship towards the cost of this project, from the European Regional Development Fund, the Sports Council Lottery and other more local sponsorship such as Langdale Estate's "The Man at the which significantly contributes towards the costs of employing Peter Entwistle, who is presently working on The Band as part of this project."

But we went back to Windermere and caught the ferry to Hawkshead and then we had lunch at a café and then we went back round on the lanes and back to the lodge. We had a rest and then we went swimming but I watched because I was still ill.

Friday, March 10th

Today we went over Kirkstone Pass but it was open so we went on it to Keswick and lunch in a café. Then we went to have a look at some camp sites to see if we could find a nice place to stay in our caravan. We went back to the lodge and got our things packed to go swimming. When we got

to the pool we stayed in for a long time.

Saturday March 11th

Today Jeanette and Rod came to see us because we had met them in France and they lived near our lodge. We had some lunch and walked around the estate to the swimming pool. We played splashing each other with water. We got out of the pool and went for a walk round Chapel Stile and Elterwater. When we finished our tea, Jeanette and Rod went home."
