Langdale diners have praised our new gourmet wine and dinner evenings for their excellent taste! Both were resounding hits, for which our chefs met the challenge of matching the finest of wines with exciting regional cuisine, to which our diners responded with enthusiasm.

Maison Louis Latour's Simon Hill worked with our chefs to present Langdale's first gourmet evening, which began with a Ruinart Champagne reception. The wines which followed all came from the Latour Domaine's grand crus vineyards in Burgundy, and dinner began with an h'ors d'oeuvres of pork and apple terrine served with with a Pouilly Fuisse '97; the Domaine de Valmoissine '98 which followed brought out the subtle flavours of an exquisite bouillabaisse, followed by a Champagne sorbet to clear the palate. Our local Grizedale Forest venison was a match for any

French faune, served with a robust Gevrey Chambertin '96, and after the cheese course, it was amazing how flagging appetites revived at the sight of Langdale's assiette of five plated desserts - with ice cream!

Just three weeks later, Lakeland Vintners were back again with Chilean wines for a Caliterra wine and gourmet dinner evening - a most fitting follow-up to our French evening, for it was Maison La Tour who sent 40 of their top winemakers to teach the Chileans

how to perfect their techniques. Using fresh Cumbrian produce, the menu created some traditional South American dishes, reflecting the Chilean fondness for smoked cheeses, fish and lamb.

More Anomalies

There are still a few "anomalies" available at bargain prices. For those new to Langdale who haven't met an anomaly before, we'll explain. Anomalies date back to the sale of the first 13 lodges in the early 1980s, when ownership weeks ran from Saturdays. Some years, guests had to arrive on Christmas or New Year's day; so fixed arrival dates were introduced for this period, and instead of selling 50 weeks per unit, Langdale sold 49. Anomalies are what we call the days left over either side of these festive season arrival dates; plus sales of 52 weeks x 7 days = 364 which adds to the stock of anomaly days; and don't forget those extra Leap Year days, which give even more opportunities for bargain breaks. We still have a few New Year weeks from £1,185 for a 2-bedroomed lodge sleeping up to six and self catering anomaly breaks are available at 1999 prices, from £55 per night.

Over A Barrel



"Langdale's location is one of its greatest attractions - but the fact that it is on the site of the old Elterwater Gunpowder Works makes it doubly attractive to Langdale owners Alan and Glenys Crocker who are experts on gunpowder production and keen members of the Gunpowder Mills Study Group. We asked them to look at the old stencil that is kept in the safe in Langdale's Timeshare office, and tell us of its significance:

"Each barrel of gunpowder manufactured in Langdale was stencilled with Elterwater's distinguishing trademark," they wrote. "The accompanying illustration is taken from a rubbing of a stencil used to mark the tops of barrels of Elterwater gunpowder. The original, which is held in the Langdale Timeshare Office, is a circular sheet, 41/8 inches across, well-used and damaged a little. The EW clearly stand for Elterwater and the

symbol at the centre is 3F, standing for triple fine gunpowder which was used in small guns. This is the only known Elterwater stencil and it is interesting that it is so small. Stencils about 131/2" in diameter were used for the standard 100lbs barrels of gunpowder, which suggests that this one was used for barrels containing only about 3lbs. Normally for amounts this small tin canisters were used. However, before they closed in 1928, the Elterwater mills were well known for being oldfashioned, so perhaps they were reluctant to use canisters although these had been used much earlier elsewhere.

We would be glad to hear from anyone who can provide further information on stencils or other gunpowder artefacts or memorabilia associated with Elterwater mills or elsewhere." Alan and Glenys Crocker, email: alanglen@glfd.freeserve.co.uk

Langdale Success: Strike up The Band!

Take a walk up Great Langdale and see how Langdale visitors have helped to repair The Band footpath. It's been quite a plod but now there's just one metre left to go. By adopting this famous path as a 'buy-way' during the last two years, your donations of £50 a metre have repaired and restored 49 metres of it. The 50th and final metre will be auctioned at next February's Lake District Tourism and Conservation

Partnership's Green Seminar by TV botanist Dr David Bellamy. If you missed out on buying a metre, don't fret - our new 'buyway' will be the badly eroded track up Harrison Stickle.

Six Hundred Trees... please

Charity begins at home - so look no further than Birch Hill Wood, just behind Elterwater Hall, to see the location of our next conservation project. The plan is to restore this ancient woodland and set up an environmental education project.

To re-instate the wood, the first task will be to clear it of invasive bracken and rhododendron, then plant 600 new trees, all native species. To raise funds, we are asking short-break hotel guests for a £1.50 opt-out levy on each stay, representing the cost of each new tree. The second part of the project involves funding an educational warden employed by the National Trust to give walks, talks and generally inform the public, especially young people, about environmental practices and issues. Digging the dirt

Burying soil underground, where there's a lot of it already, seems a little eccentric - but Kirstie Royce, Manager of the Lake District Tourism and Conservation Partnership, has a very good reason for filling a glass vial with dirt, to place it in a Millennium time capsule in an Ambleside park. The soil is from Stoney Lane, a pretty Ambleside footpath which needs re-surfacing to allow wheelchair access. The Partnership has raised £2,000 towards the

work, and in order to explain the principles of conservation to future generations, the vial of soil will be buried with an explanatory scroll along with other time capsule contributions in Rothay Park.

Langdale's support of the Partnership continues in practical as well as financial ways. Our guests have given a total of £60,000 to fund Langdale's Man at the Top over the past few years, working with the National Trust footpath repair team. We've also created the Partnership's website, and participated in "Going for Green", the Partnership's ecology and business conference in spring. Among the current schemes to which you can contribute online through Langdale's website are: habitat protection of birds and small mammals in Deerbolt and Redbank Woods, Grasmere; woodland management improve the habitat of dormice in the Duddon Valley; footpath repairs, Kentmere bridleway at Longsleddale and Harrison Stickle, Great Langdale.

The Paris Residence:

"Spacious, luxurious and immaculate..."

Although there were still builders working on the ground floor when they arrived, Shirley's first impression as they walked through the door was one of "calm"; welcoming letters from the General Manager and Operations Manager awaited them and staff explained how things like the air conditioning worked, before leaving the

Camms to explore the beautifully appointed and spacious rooms. The apartment sleeps 6-8 people, and little touches such as fresh fruit and flowers were much appreciated. The contents of the mini bar were reasonably priced and included a selection of wine cold drinks, complimentary bottled water, replenished daily. The management even remembered fresh lemon and lime for the gin and tonic and Shirley says that all staff were very friendly, attentive and helpful at all times, with someone permanently on duty at the front desk. Postcards left there were stamped and posted, and all requests dealt with promptly - even for some sewing thread that Shirley needed.

The king-sized bed had six pillows, with fresh bed linen three times a week, and the luxurious bathroom with very large jacuzzi bath and shower had a daily change of towels and



bath robes. Linen table cloths and napkins were replaced as used, with fine cutlery, crockery and glasses: "One night we had a cheese and wine meal from provisions we had bought during the day. At the end of the meal, room service (available 24 hours a day) came up and cleared away for us."

The convenience of room service allowed the Camms to eat in when they felt like it. Both full and light breakfasts are available, and they also had dinner in the apartment one night. With the helpful information provided in folders and magazines, the

Camms were also able to make the most of dining out, and were delighted to find a wide choice of very reasonably priced restaurants, and cheap city transport - most Metro journeys only cost 55 francs.

"Our total bill for the apartment for the week was just over £120, which included items from the mini bar, phone calls and meals: two breakfasts and one dinner each... a brilliant holiday."

In At The Deep End!

Finding good young managers is always a problem. Langdale's reputation for growing its own to get the quality is well-known, though at just five years old, future trainee manager Anthony Woodcock was probably one of Langdale's youngest recruits!

The year was 1983 when Anthony first arrived on holiday with his mum, dad and two brothers. It was the time when Langdale was still in its first phase... and winters still had snow and ice! A chance visit to see Langdale's famous palm tree growing by the pool tempted the Woodcocks from Worcestershire to buy Week 2 in Lodge 23. The next seven winter holidays were spent sledging on Red Bank, sliding about on the ice, or swimming in the pool before school work put an end to the Woodcocks' term-time week. After leaving school, Anthony's love of cooking prompted him to study for a B.Sc in Hotel and Catering at Sheffield Hallam University. The four year course included a year's practical experience and to his delight, Anthony ended up in the Canadian Rockies at the Banff Springs Hotel in Alberta, one of the world's top ten resort hotels: "The hotel was simply huge; I worked in just one of several restaurants where we had 450 covers; in summer there were 1,300 staff, and 700 in winter. It was a wonderful place; Langdale is quite similar really, with mountain

scenery all round - just smaller! We skied four times a week, and went snowboarding too."

After his return, Anthony completed his degree. Then, one day while looking for his first job, he opened a copy of the "Hotel and Caterer" magazine and found himself staring at his past....and his future. There, on the page before him, was an advertisement for a trainee manager at Langdale:

"And here I am, back again. It's quite strange to look out of my bedroom window in the staff accommodation, and see Lodge 23 right opposite!"

As a trainee manager, Anthony has to work his way through every department. A stint in Lodge Housekeeping took him back in time, to Brotherswater and a host of happy memories: "Everything has been changed since we were there, yet it's still familiar - I know just about every trick a kid can get up to with bubble bath in a whirlpool!"

While Anthony was learning sales and marketing, he used his IT skills to good advantage, helping to re-design Langdale's website and contributing to Lifestyle:

"I enjoyed that very much, and I like working with food and beverages because I love cooking. I've had my fair share of embarrassing moments... I was mixing up a Junior Pina Colada cocktail one day in the Terrace, showing off a bit and spinning the shaker; but I forgot to hold the top on with my thumb when I gave it



a final big shake, and I threw orange juice all over the Assistant Terrace Manager, Matthew Nelson, and down the walls! I don't think that was quite as embarrassing as the day I failed to recognise Mr David Fairs, the former Managing Director at Langdale, and asked him where his Country Club pass was!"

As every trainee manager knows, working in the hotel industry demands a wide range of qualifications, and to refine Anthony's management skills, he took part in Langdale's recent management training day, where he was asked to abseil 140 feet

down a vertical cliff face in company with MD David Banks and other members of Langdale's most senior management team. "The point of it all was to encourage better communications and team work. Luckily I used to be a Venture Scout, but I've never been down a rockface as steep as this, and I managed to scrape both legs. I didn't say anything about it at the time, and when the day ended with an awards ceremony, mine was for 'Falling off a cliff and suffering in silence'!

Anthony's qualifications for management should be impeccable!



Today Langdale - Tomorrow The World

Langdale owners have an exciting new world of exchange opportunities on the horizon.

The World's Leading Resorts, WLR, is to be launched in the autumn to provide high-quality, 'like-for-like' exchanges between owners at first-class resorts. In recognition of Langdale's reputation for quality, it was not only one of the first resorts to be invited to join WLR, but is also playing an active role in its development and is represented on their Board.

Membership of The World's Leading Resorts is by invitation only and resorts in the UK, Madeira, the Canary Islands, and India have already responded positively. In addition, quality resorts are in the process of being identified in North and South America, and in South Africa. The initial plan is to attract 20 to 25 founding-resorts and to increase this to about 100 over the next three years. The intention is that these 100 resorts will be situated

in a variety of different types of locations - mountains, coastal, near places of interest, etc. where there is provision for different types of activities - walking, golf, watersports, sightseeing, etc. and all in first-class locations, offering first-class accommodation facilities.

The reason for the formation of The World's Leading Resorts was that owners in the best resorts wanted to know that when exchanging they would get a resort of comparable quality. The timeshare industry has also recognised the need for such an exchange organisation, and RCI, the largest timeshare exchange organisation, will operate the exchange system. RCI are minority shareholders in The WLR, so the decisions as to which resorts are invited to join rests with The World's Leading Resorts and not RCI. This also means that The World's Leading Resorts is not restricted only to RCI resorts and approach any resort,

regardless of whether it has any existing affiliations, with the proviso that the resort conforms to their exacting standards.

When operational, an inventory list of the weeks which have been registered will be sent to all the owners who have joined. They then have four weeks in which to choose their preferred exchanges, which must include three destinations and three dates. Over the next four weeks, the match-making process takes place.

If the exchange fails, there are three possible outcomes:

- the week can be returned to the owner;
- owners may select an RCI exchange instead; or,
- points may be allocated in the Club Resorts International, CRI, system.

Because WLR members belong to resorts which by definition are of first-class quality, the number of CRI points they will attract will be high and an owner may be able to have an exchange of two weeks for only one put into the system, though the quality of the resort which is taken will not be up to the standard of those of The World's Leading Resorts. Any unused points may be saved for future holidays.

One of the main reasons driving The World's Leading Resorts is to provide owners with a more equitable exchange system and pricing is based on the philosophy that owners should, as far as possible, only pay for what they receive. To cover administrative costs, the initial joining fee and annual subscription are likely to be of the order of £25 and £60 respectively. The exchange fee is £100, but if no match is found, the week may be returned to the owner for his, or her, use along with the exchange fee, less a £10 handling charge.
