Wainwrights' scoops 'best pint' award

Wainwrights' Inn has scooped all the other pubs in Cumbria to win the prestigious Cask Marque Award from Jennings Brewery.

The annual award is given by the brewery to the pub which, in its opinion, serves the finest pint of Jennings' ales.

It works like this: tasters from the Brewery secretly visit every pub that serves Jennings on four separate occasions to assess the quality of the brew served. It is a knockout-style competition, where each visit reduces the number of pubs in the running.

By the fourth round the tasters — who, we assume, are still sober enough to make a sound judgment — have whittled down the field to find the pub that pours the best pint of Jennings.

Wainwrights' is already proud of its entry in the Good Pub Guide, and this additional accolade seals its reputation as one of the best pubs in the area.

Refurb programme rolls on

We have just completed the refurbishment of our popular Waterside rooms.

This is part of a programme in the Hotel to refurbish ten rooms per year to ensure that the Langdale standard of quality remains high.

We are now getting on with the refurbishment of our conference rooms to extremely high standards

The Pillar and Gateway rooms have already been done and plans are currently being put together for the Partners Room and the Room at the Top.

The biggest programme, which is now complete, was the considerable upgrading of the Chapel Stile Apartments.

This included new leather furniture for the lounge; new dining suites and games tables in oak; the redecoration of lounges, bedrooms, hallways and passages; and many new beds and mattresses.

We have also installed new Amtico floors and ceramic hobs in the kitchens, and fitted gas central heating and hot water systems with separate boilers for each apartment, to control and monitor use of utilities. There are new designated car parking areas for each apartment.

Lodge 67 owners will be aware of subsidence problems with the property.

This was found to be caused by movement of the concrete raft supporting the outhouse, and has been solved by tearing down and rebuilding the outhouse using the original materials after replacement of the shoring and concrete floor.

Congratulations to Colin Lister who project managed this tricky work, getting it done on time and on budget.

Heading Mill converted into staff accommodation

The conversion of the Heading Mill into new staff accommodation is now complete.

The upgrade demonstrates Langdale's commitment to retaining good staff by providing quality housing as an incentive. Few other hotels offer anything of a similar quality; most accommodation is fairly grotty.

There are four self-contained, en-suite units over the Maintenance Department offices and Grounds store. Two of the rooms have spectacular views over the Langdale Beck.


This is an historic building where the gunpowder barrels, made by the hoopers and coopers in the cooperage (now Lodge 81), had their heads (lids) fitted. This was done with a special tool that finished off the edges of the barrel staves. A set of these tools is on display in Purdey's Restaurant and Hobson's Bar.

Anniversary of Man at the Top

The Man at the Top programme celebrates its fifth anniversary this summer.

The programme was launched in the Autumn edition of Views 1994, when we asked Langdale owners to help raise funds for the National Trust's footpath repair team.

The objective was to fund an extra worker to help the team working to repair eroded footpaths in the Langdale Valley.

Within a short time, thanks to your generosity, we had raised over £2000.

The following May, the House of Commons Environmental Select Committee paid a visit to Langdale to see first-hand Our Man at the Top project. By that time we had raised over £6000, and Clive Stretton had been officially appointed Our Man at the Top.

In our Autumn edition 1995,

we were announcing that Our Man had topped £10,000 — and still climbing! Clive was by then paying regular visits to Langdale, giving slide presentations so that guests were kept informed of work being carried out.

Spring 1996 found Clive working up on Loughrigg restoring some seriously eroded sections of the path. But the exciting news was the appointment of the second Man at the Top, sponsored by Heart of the Lakes, who thought that Langdale's sponsorship was such a good idea that they decided to raise money for one of their own. Contributions are still coming in nicely.

In 1997, we were announcing that over £15,500 had been raised, but that we still needed help to continue to support Our Man. We began inviting owners to contribute by adding a donation to their management fees. This initiative has proven to be very successful and donations increased

In the Spring of 1998, Clive was (sadly for us!) promoted to the post of National Trust Warden for Duddon and Eskdale.

Phil O'Donaghue bravely filled in until a new permanent man could be found.

Last Autumn, we announced the appointment of Peter Entwistle who officially took over as our sponsored footpath repairman.

Talking to Peter, we learned that there was serious damage to paths on The Band. So we asked for donations of £50 which would pay for the cost of renewing one metre.

To date, we have sponsored 7 metres on top of continued regular contributions. The good news is that this year we have raised more than ever; to date the grand total is just over £50,000.

The footpath repair programme has recently won a silver medal in the English Tourist Board's England for Excellence Award, and was Highly Commended in British Airways Global Tourism of Tomorrow Awards. There are now three Men at the Top – all inspired by Langdale's pioneering programme.

Many thanks to everyone who has supported – and continues to support – this very important initiative.

David Banks has been appointed as my successor. I have no doubt he is absolutely the right person for the job and, with your help and the support and backing of our excellent staff, I am sure that Langdale will go from strength to strength.

Squirrels: now buy the T-shirt

Casey Allum, our squirrel monitor, has launched a range of merchandise to help save the threatened creatures

It would appear that I have quite a following from reports my father comes home with and people asking my mother if I'm really only twelve. Actually I'm nearly fourteen now.

People have told me about sightings of more grey squirrels during the winter months. Yes, we do have greys in Cumbria but people forget that the red squirrels' fur colour is variable: from

bright ginger through to red and dark brown or black tinged with grey in winter.

They also have larger ear tufts in mid-winter which disappear in the summer, and bushy tails which bleach white by late summer.

A lady who was staying at Elterwater Hall mentioned that she had seen a grey/red squirrel and possibly this was a hybrid of some sort. I think that because squirrels are territorial that it is highly unlikely (but not impossible)

Red squirrels have declined in most of the UK and are really confined to isolated populations in Wales and to only four places in central England. They are still widespread in the North of England and Scotland, but even here their range is contracting.

I am always trying new ways to improve the help we offer the squirrels at Langdale. Last year, Merediths shop in the Country Club asked to sponsor us by providing more feeders for the Estate.

We have produced a special red squirrel postcard which has proven to be very popular and are now offering a selection of T-shirts which I have designed.

With the purchase of each



shirt (child sizes only), there will be a £1 donation towards the purchase of squirrel feed. Shirts are suitable for children from age 3 to 11 and cost £7.50 including post and packing.

Management Fees

The Management fees for the year commencing 1st May 1999 have been set as shown in the table below. This represents a 5% increase on the previous year as, following increases of below inflation in recent years, it is consid-

ered necessary because:

Payroll costs are increasing faster than inflation - partly due to wage inflation being greater than the increase in the Retail Price Index and partly due to increases in staff levels. As the lodges age they require a little more maintenance. The Management Company has requested an increase in its profits above inflation. Reserve Fund contributions increases continue to exceed inflation.
