THE LAST LANGDALE LODGE

Early in the misty autumn morning of Monday, 22nd September, whilst most of the Langdale Estate lay sleeping, a large articulated lorry with the last Langdale Lodge trudged wearily up the twisting lanes of the valley.

The construction team, headed by Manager Dave Garrick, were there, ready and waiting to pounce on Lodge 80 and, for the last time, work with those familiar pieces of material to complete the five year building programme.

Helped by one or two rudely awakened lodge owners, the reception committee marked the historic event with a sip of



champagne and a cheer. It was 57 months since the first lodge was delivered on 20th January 1982, when the bemused construction team pored over the first plans.

It now only takes 14 days to get the roof on a three-bedroomed lodge, while a one-bedroomed lodge can reach that stage in half the time.

And so, some may shed the odd tear, while others shout the odd cheer as the last slate goes into position on lodge 80 and the Estate is finally put to bed!

LOCAL thoughts

Any development the size of Langdale must be aware of the impact on the local community of its presence. In the initial stages of planning a great deal was done to inform our neighbours of our plans, but over the next months, the speed of progress within the Estate had distracted our attention from this most important responsibility.

However, recently, a couple of Senior Managers from the Company called a meeting to discuss mutual problems out of which a whole new relationship is building up.

Rather than dominating the local scene, we are seeking to merge in with it, and play our part in protecting local interest and fostering a neighbourly spirit.

Already, we have assisted in the writing, editing and circulation of a local newsletter — The Langdale Valley News — which some of you will have seen at Reception. We are further involved in helping the local bowling club to repair their Green and surrounding areas. The Club expect to be able to extend the use of the Green to lodge owners in return.

We have further plans for the future protection and development of the community in an area we all enjoy so much.

THE FORMATION OF LANGDALE LEISURE LTD

The whole of the business activities and assets of the Langdale Partnership has been incorporated into a new limited company, so that all transactions are now



conducted in the name of Langdale Leisure Limited. The Partnership was originally formed in 1981 to develop the Langdale Estate and has remained largely as formed since that time. As the wider business interests of the Partnership have grown over the intervening years the Partnership structure became less and less appropriate for their expanding commercial activities. With advice from their Bankers, Lawyers and Accountants it was decided to form Langdale Leisure Ltd. from the Partnership, because a company structure was considered to be more suitable to cover current and future

expansion. You will be pleased to learn that each of the Partners remains a shareholder in the Company and retains a keen interest in all that goes on at Langdale. This development has no effect on the rights of timeowners or the service provided by the Langdale Management Company, which your Lodge Owners' Committee together with the Company's management will ensure meets the requirements for owners to enjoy all that is good at Langdale.

COMMENTS FROM THE OWNERS' CLUB COMMITTEE

FINANCE SUB-COMMITTEE

We are looking for an extra member to join the Finance Sub-Committee and widen the experience at its disposal in the increasingly important work that is required. Many of the services at Langdale are performed jointly for the lodges, the Pillar Hotel and Club and, to a lesser extent, for the building operations. We need to feel confident that lodge owners are being charged no more than their fair share of the cost of these services.

The Finance Sub-Committee would, therefore, welcome the assistance of an owner with experience in work measurement to support their efforts in the interests of lodge owners. The Sub-Committee meets three or four times annually, usually at Langdale on Sundays, and any owner willing to join is invited to send details of his or her experience to Douglas Whipp at the address below.



INSURANCE

Many owners have expressed confusion about what is or is not covered by the insurance for which they pay through the management charge or as an optional extra.

We are glad to report that, as from 1st May 1987, "All Risks" cover will be included in the management charge and owners will not have to worry about whether or not to take extra cover.

It will be particularly important to report any damage or breakages promptly so that the management can claim under the All Risks policy and so avoid bearing the cost of repairs or replacements.



WASHING MACHINES

We are glad to report that the two washing machines and a drier are proving to be in great demand, so much so that their heavy use has led to occasional breakdowns!

The experience shows that the demand is there and the machines are to be replaced in due course by heavy duty industrial models to ensure trouble-free operation in future.



MICROWAVE OVENS

Very little demand for the hire of microwave ovens has emerged as yet. To date, the average hiring rate is only 1.5 ovens per week (how the users of

the .5 of an oven cope we can't imagine!)

As this low demand is possibly because of insufficient publicity, the availability of a microwave is now being notified to owners in the letter accompanying their management charge invoice.

The popularity of the hire scheme is being kept under review. A report

will be made at the Annual General Meeting on 18th January and a decision taken then on whether to continue with the scheme.

PERSONAL NEEDS AND PREFERENCES

We often receive requests from owners for their lodge to be equipped with this or that utensil, or fitted with some additional item or other. Taken in isolation these are usually not unreasonable requests and often of quite small cost.

There is, however, a standard lodge inventory which goes towards determining the cost of our lodges. It would be manifestly unfair to have some lodges of similar size more fully equipped than others in order to meet individual owners' personal preferences.

Usually, there is a simple answer, already adopted by some families — if you cannot live without a non-stick frying pan, a tea strainer, or a tea cosy - bring your own!



In the past few months, considerable effort has been channelled into

ensuring that the Energy Monitoring System (EMS) provides consistently accurate information on the energy consumption of each

Modifications have been made to the EMS to improve its functional security and repairs carried out as required.

In the future, the EMS will be the subject of regular checks which should provide the necessary confidence in the system demanded by both the Management Company and lodge owners.



At the time of writing (mid-November), there have been 72 requests for swapping and approaching one third of these have been successfully matched. This is getting easier as the "bank" is growing, but a "reserve bank" of people who are not tied to any particular week, so long as they visit Langdale, would be useful.

There is, of course, a great demand for the weeks when the schools are on holiday. For example, in 1987 there are many requests to move to week 8 from week 7, with nobody wanting the reverse; there is of course no guarantee a swap can be arranged.

We apologise if it was not made clear in the information and forms which were circulated that the £10 fee was not returnable. It is used to cover the cost of printing, telephone calls, etc., with the surplus helping to keep down management charges.

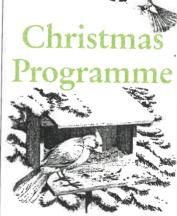
As regular visitors to the Pillar we thought you would be interested in the new and varied 'delights' awaiting you on a visit to Purdeys Restaurant.

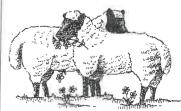
We have prepared a special Xmas programme which should appeal to everyone, with special treats for the children, which include a visit to Santa's Grotto and Magicians and a disco.

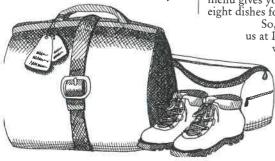

Wildlife at Langdale

- Summer/Autumn

What a mixed up jumble we had to call Summer this year! Overall it was about normal but we certainly had extremes — the September rainfall figure at Windermere was just a quarter inch; August was a washout.

Many birds nested much later than expected and some, untypically, raised second and even third broods during our Indian Summer.

The nest boxes were homes to both pied and spotted flycatchers, blue and great tits and one brood of nuthatches. Other breeding birds included great spotted woodpeckers (on the hill above lodge 11), tawny owls (near lodge 36) and treecreepers (on the riverside above lodge 30). There were many others,

A lot of lodge owners were delighted by the sight of young red squirrels but very few saw the foxes which have now visited the estate almost every evening since St. George's Day. To my intense displeasure mink have again been seen around the grounds — these indiscriminate predators are not nearly so attractive as they appear. Unlike most predators, which control prey populations, mink have a tendency to exhaust them and then move on to pillage elsewhere.

On Great Langdale Beck dippers increased and kingfishers were, at least occasionally, in evidence.

Swallows could often be seen sipping water while on the wing alongside the Skelwith to Elterwater track and, during the driest periods, chaffinches were lined up like Edwardian ladies and gentlemen taking the waters.

One last thing — during Winter feed the birds as you like but if it is really cold they'll be equally grateful

for a drink.

GOLFING

July 1986 saw the best of our golfers compete in Langdale's first Mens' Singles Open Golf Championships.
